

The Facebook page is called "Land Registry. The Facts".

The more questions that are asked when buying property/land, the better. This is also true when dealing with Land Registry.

Other sources of information can be found by way of collecting Estate Agents literature for properties/land in same proximity.

Visits to local churches/graveyards will kick up common names in the area and is handy if these names come up to do with the property/land you are interested in. Check your solicitor has a current practicing certificate and that damp proof certificates match with property addresses. British Archives can provide free photocopies for the post code/address area, for you to choose to purchase from them blow up photos. Nothing to stop you just obtaining the free copies. Walking groups are the best places to approach for obtaining detailed maps of the area. Libraries have archive newspapers, and it is worth spending time on local news for the area, to find out if any plans for changes or further building.

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
